EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS



Students are invited to discover what it was like to be a boarding student in the 19th century during their tour of the following exhibitions—*The Young Ladies Academy* and *Recollections of a House*. This trip back in time allows students to appreciate the lifestyle and academic subject matter taught in schools during this era.

DURATION: 60-MINUTE TOUR

TOPICS COVERED

History

Through the study of small-scale models, students learn about the expansion and development of the Ursuline School, which was the first learning institution for girls in North America.

• The boarding school

Students relive the daily life of a boarding student. Dormitories, the chapel, refectories, classes and recreational activities all help illustrate the lifestyle of 19th–century schoolgirls.

School subjects

Students learn about the different subjects studied at school as well as the Ursuline nuns' educational philosophy.

THE TOUR

Students explore the themes presented during their interactive tour of the *Recollections* of a House and The Young Ladies Academy exhibitions. Throughout the tour, they participate in the following activities related to the program topics:
